Identification The capsules of A. dealbatus are very distinctive, being erect or slightly inclined, asymmetrical, with a conspicuously long neck, and are normally produced in abundance. In contrast, its shoots are inconspicuous, short (up to 2 cm tall) and Bryum-like, but darker. The leaves are 3 mm long, delicate and translucent, with large, lax cells.

Similar species Meesia uliginosa (p. 574), a frequent associate, has rather similar, but curved, capsules and bluntly tipped leaves. The more or less erect capsules with a long neck are completely different from the usually shorter, pendulous capsules of Bryum species. The rare Tayloria lingulata (p. 568) has differently shaped leaves and capsules.

Habitat Base-rich flushes in the mountains, and short, damp turf in open, coastal dune slacks.
