
## Rhynchostegium confertum

Clustered Feather-moss

Key 368





Identification This very common moss forms mid-green patches on wood and stones. It is irregularly branched, with prostrate, ascending or curved branches. Branch and stem leaves are similar, 1-1.5 mm long, egg-shaped or narrowly egg-shaped, tapering to a slender point. They are moderately concave and sometimes slightly curved to the side. When dry, they are not or only slightly shrunken, and not at all twisted. The leaves have a single nerve and very finely toothed margins. Capsules are common and often plentiful. These are curved, egg-shaped or oblong, with a beaked lid, and borne on a rather short (6-10 mm long), erect, smooth seta.

Similar species R. murale (p. 760) normally has concave leaves and cylindrical shoots, with branches often blunt at the tip. R. megapolitanum (p. 762) has a loosely branched growth form and is not closely attached to the substrate. It also differs in the shape of the stem leaves, which are broadly egg-shaped in the lower part and have a slender, tapering tip. The very rare R. rotundifolium (p. 763) has broader leaves which become shrunken and twisted when dry. Brachythecium velutinum (p. 745) differs in its narrowly triangular and hardly concave leaves, and capsules that have a roughened seta and conical lid. Slender forms of Hygrohypnum Iuridum (p. 731), especially on damp stonework, have leaves that are usually more strongly curved, with a broader tip, and its capsules are curved and elliptical. The rare Sematophyllum substrumulosum (p. 794) has similar capsules, but with an even longer beak to the lid, and has nerveless leaves with a long, tapering tip.

Habitat R. confertum is common on both wood and stones. It is characteristic on living trees in the lowlands, particularly old elders (Sambucus nigra), but it also occurs on roots, stumps and logs. It also frequents stones, rocks, walls and other man-made structures that are not too acidic. It is usually found in light to moderate shade, in woodland, churchyards, waysides, gardens and similar places.
